WALT: Find out what mistakes people make when recycling

Facts and figures to include

It takes around 95% less energy to make products from recycled materials than from raw materials.

Recycling one drink can could save enough energy to power a TV for four hours!

If everyone in the UK recycled one toothpaste box, it would save enough energy to run a fridge in over 2,000 homes for a year.

In the UK, we recycle 60% of glass packaging - but that means 40% is going to landfill.
